This month's group of Akrampa School teachers begins with Agnes Agblor. Agnes is the eldest of the female teachers, at the age of 55 years. She teaches Grade One (1st grade) pupils and has been in the school for the past 4 years. She is married with 5 children of her own and comes from the eastern part of Ghana in the region known as the Volta Region. Agnes is a typical mother, the type that our Education Service administrators prefer to have teaching Grade One instead of younger teachers with less experience with very young children. "Auntie Aggie", as she is popularly called, is also one of the people in charge of leading the Devotion Service we conduct for the children every Wednesday. She likes to read the Bible and listen to Christian music.

Edward Ayittey is our next teacher. Eddie, as he is popularly called, is the computer teacher who will be using the computers bought by FLC to teach the children. He teaches all of the classes, grades One through Six, excluding Kindergarten. Eddie is 28 years old and has been with the school for 3 years. He is yet to marry. Eddie is very hardworking, and very enthusiastic about his task to teach computer knowledge to his pupils! That is why he is able to handle all six classes. Eddie has a good sense of humor so he is able to relate to all of his colleagues very well. He also comes from the eastern part of Ghana, but closer to the capital than where Aggie comes from. He likes reading novels and working on the computer.

This set of teachers concludes with James Amuzu. James is 25 years old and loves to read and watch movies. He is also yet to marry. James comes from the eastern part of Ghana known as the Volta Region, like Aggie. He has been teaching in the Akrampa School for 2 years and teaches mathematics. He is, in addition to his special field, assigned to Grade 5 (5th grade) as the class teacher. James relates very well with his colleagues, but is a quiet person and can often be found alone reading a book.
